
FROM THE BOARD CHAIR AND EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

The George Hull Centre continues to offer a comprehensive service continuum to children, youth and families with varying degrees of vulnerability.


Our commitment to clinical excellence, teaching and research is evident in every program.

Mission Statement

The George Hull Centre is a multidisciplinary, innovative children's mental health centre.

The purpose of The George Hull Centre is to reduce suffering and to enhance the quality of life of children, youth and families.

The George Hull Centre engages the community, its families and volunteers in a variety of partnerships to provide hope, solutions and positive outcomes.

The George Hull Centre served 5,333 children and their families in 2008-2009.

COMMUNITY SERVICES

The Community Clinic sees families with children from birth through to eighteen years. Families are seen by clinicians for assessment of the problem and the development of a treatment plan with the family and the child. Clinical services include assessment, family, individual and group treatment, psychological and psychiatric evaluation. Groups and workshops addressing common problems that children and their parents face are offered to clients on the waiting list, clients in active treatment and families in the community. Topics include parenting challenging children, parenting adolescents, anxious children, angry children/angry parents. 748 families were seen for assessment and treatment. 691 participants attended clinical and health promotion groups and workshops.

The George Hull Centre is the local coordinating agency for **West Toronto Preschool Speech and Language Services**. The program provides community-based speech and language services to children and their families before the children are eligible for senior kindergarten. The range of services includes assessment, consultation and support to parents and staff in child care settings, training for parents and professionals, and group or individual therapy. 440 clients were served at The George Hull Centre. 1,889 were served throughout the West Quadrant.

Ontario Early Years Centre

The George Hull Centre is the host centre for the Ontario Early Years Centre for the Etobicoke Centre riding. The Ontario Early Years Centre offers early learning and literacy activities, outreach services and parent training to children from birth to age six and their families. 1,365 children and 1,257 parents/caregivers attended the Ontario Early Years Centre.

COMMUNITY SERVICES

The Shared Care consultation program provides timely psychiatric assessment to children from birth to age six who are referred by community physicians. 135 children were assessed.

The Special Needs Resource Service provides consultation and support to licensed child care centres to support the inclusion of children with complex or intensive developmental, social, emotional or behavioural needs. 34 children were served and 6 workshops presented to a total of 55 participants.

The Etobicoke Brighter Futures Coalition is a project sponsored by The George Hull Centre. The George Hull Centre works collaboratively with its Coalition partners to plan, develop and deliver services and programs that will improve the health and well-being of vulnerable young children within the context of their families and their communities. Together, we work toward the creation of a seamless network of integrated services for all children from birth to age six and their families in Etobicoke.

The Highfield Community Enrichment Project is one of eight Better Beginnings, Better Futures prevention demonstration projects in the province. It focuses on the positive development of children ages four to eight who attend Highfield Junior School. The key program components are school-based programs, family support and community development. 84 volunteers support the project. 1,680 children were served.

More than 90% of respondents said the programs benefit them and their families and they would definitely recommend the programs to a friend.

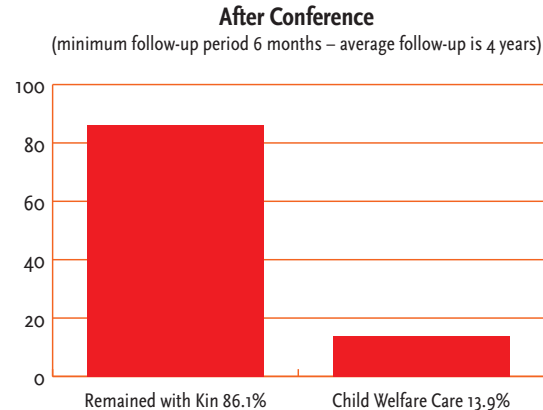
87% of respondents rated their overall program experience as “excellent” or “very good”.



COMMUNITY SERVICES

The Family Group Conferencing Project of Toronto is a collaborative partnership with The George Hull Centre, The Etobicoke Children's Centre, Children's Aid Society of Toronto, Catholic Children's Aid Society of Toronto, Jewish Family and Child Service of Toronto and Native Child and Family Services of Toronto.

The main objective of FGC is to give the extended family group (i.e., nuclear family, extended family, and friends) a voice in the decision-making process to ensure the safety and well-being of children at-risk or in need of protection. FGC is a culturally-sensitive, alternative approach to child protection that empowers marginalized families; bringing together family group members to craft a plan of care for their children that addresses concerns identified by child welfare/children's mental health professionals. 54 conferences were held, planning for 151 children. 491 children have been planned for in the past eleven years, with over 85% of children remaining with or returning to their kinship system.



The Family Group Conferencing Ontario Provincial Resource, led by The George Hull Centre, is a quality assurance body, designed to promote and protect the model fidelity of Family Group Conferencing as one of the child welfare Alternative Dispute Resolution approaches. It provides training and consultation across the province, and maintains a provincial roster of qualified coordinators, trainers and mentors. As of March 31, 2009, there were 45 coordinators, 20 coordinators in training, 16 trainers and 12 mentors on the roster.

Results of a satisfaction questionnaire indicated that all respondents would recommend the family group conferencing training, with 88% indicating it was excellent.

RESIDENTIAL AND DAY TREATMENT SERVICES

George Hull has changed my life. I now know what it feels like to be loved selflessly, and that is found nowhere else. I owe George Hull such gratitude for saving my life and believing I could make something of myself. Without their dedication, I never would have known what it was like to trust someone completely and totally; for someone to feel compassionate towards me.

Libby's Place and the **Boys House** are residential treatment programs for adolescents between the ages of 13 and 18. The residents come with pain and sadness, which is expressed through anger and extreme self-destructive behaviours. Most have given up on themselves and their future. The programs reflect a Centre-wide commitment to competency-based approaches to treatment. Both programs are highly structured, emphasizing and using both individual and group strengths. Family involvement is encouraged at every level of the programs. 19 adolescents received residential and family treatment.

"The George Hull Program has opened up many new opportunities for myself and my family...Although there are still many issues that I haven't dealt with, I feel strong, independent, and completely fulfilled, capable of reaching my goals. Thanks to the George Hull Program, I once again feel motivated to gain control of my life and reach for the stars!" *Adolescent client*

The School Program serves residents of Libby's Place and the Boys House, as well as adolescents from the community who are unable to manage in their local schools. The program is offered in collaboration with the Toronto District School Board and the Toronto Catholic District School Board. The youth who attend the school exhibit acute or chronic behavioural, emotional, or learning difficulties. The purpose of the program is academic achievement and the development of cognitive, social and linguistic skills that are necessary for successful adjustment at home, school and in the community. 54 students attended, earning 180 academic credits.

I can remember the first day I came here. I wanted to kill everybody and myself. I vowed that I wouldn't do any work, to not make any friends, and don't talk to anybody. I hated this place so much. Finally, I got used to it and it's great! I'm getting work done. I've made friends and talked to everybody!

RESIDENTIAL AND DAY TREATMENT SERVICES

Clear Directions is a collaborative program provided by The George Hull Centre for Children and Families, Breakaway and The Toronto District School Board. The program is designed to assist youth, 18 years and under, who are struggling with serious substance abuse and mental health issues and who live in the Greater Toronto Area.

A multidisciplinary team working within a harm reduction philosophy engages youth by acknowledging and building on strength, instilling hope and inviting family and friends into the classroom and therapy room. A continuum of care encompassing outreach, individual and family therapy, day treatment, psychiatric consultation, residential care, case management and follow up is offered. 16 adolescents were served.



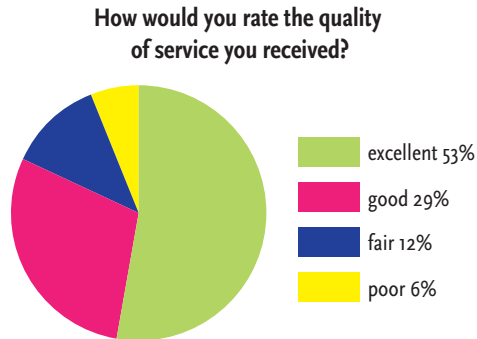

RESEARCH AND PROGRAM EVALUATION

From the Client Satisfaction Questionnaires:



The Research and Program Evaluation Department is responsible for program evaluation and quality assurance activities across the Centre. The department also supports education and training at the Centre.

A Vital Idea grant from the Toronto Community Foundation funded an evaluation of the 2008 Highfield Summer Enrichment Program, which prepares children for kindergarten. The evaluation

found that at the end of the program, social skills, concrete skills and comfort with school routines increased. 90% of parents reported that their children were less anxious about starting kindergarten and 94% of parents reported that they were less

anxious about having their children start kindergarten.

The Community Clinic received a grant from the Provincial Centre of Excellence for Child and Youth Mental Health to develop an evaluation plan for the Short Term Intervention Program, which offers families three pre-scheduled sessions with a team of two clinicians. The evaluation will determine the effectiveness of the program.

Training Future Professionals

Through the Centre's formal affiliation agreement with the University of Toronto, The George Hull Centre provided learning opportunities to 4 residents in psychiatry, 29 medical students, 4 social work students, and 1 speech and language pathology student.

The Centre also welcomed 12 child & youth work students from George Brown, Humber and Sheridan Colleges and Ryerson University; 2 nursing students from Humber College and Ryerson University; 3 social service work students from Humber College and Medix School, 2 family therapy interns and 4 Family Group Conferencing coordinators-in-training.

The Paul Steinhauer Award for Best Postgraduate Teacher in Child Psychiatry was awarded to **Dr. Marianne Gocker**, Community Clinic psychiatrist.

The Robert L. Smith Award for excellence in child and adolescent psychotherapy was awarded to **Dr. Kira Payne**, resident in psychiatry, for her work in applying Acceptance and Commitment Therapy with adolescents.

Michael Syron Memorial Bursary

The Michael Syron Memorial Bursary was established in honour of Michael Syron, the founding Board Chair of the Centre. His dedication and vision contributed to the Centre and to the Etobicoke community. Funded by his children, Laura Syron, Stephanie Taaffe and Philip Syron, the bursary is presented annually to a university or college bound student graduating from a school located in the former City of Etobicoke.

The bursary assists students who have done well in school and contributed to the community despite adverse personal circumstances.

The 2009 Michael Syron Memorial Bursary was presented to Muna Abukar, who excelled academically and contributed to her school and the community.

I might end up angry like my sister. That we will never be a full family again. *Girl, age 11*

My dad hit me a lot. My mom and dad are fighting a lot. *Girl, age 9*

By coming to GHC, what changes are you hoping to see in your life or in your family?

That we all become friends and adult problems do not become my problems. *Boy, age 9*

Independence. Well, figuring out our roles in each other's lives. *Boy, age 17*

Me not getting angry so easily and me getting more confidence. I'm hoping to see my family bonding more and talking together. *Girl, age 13*

My weight, my money situation and my substance abuse. *Girl, age 16*

I would like to hear less screaming and banging and be sure that my sister and my mom are safe at home. *Boy, age 13*

How do you think we could best help you and your family make the changes you want?

I don't know how you can change the way we are, but you can try. There is one way though, you could tell us to get together and get to know each other. *Boy, age 12*

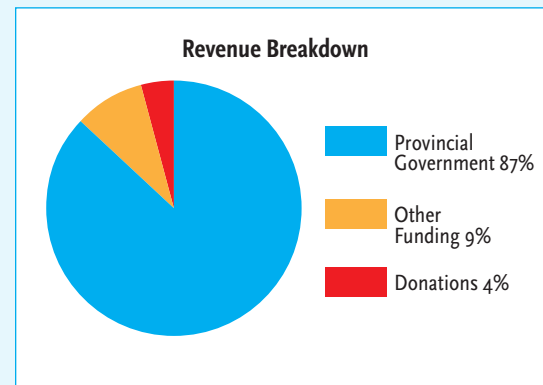
Keep/maintain connection in case of future problems. *Boy, age 17*
